AINTT Proceedings on "ASEAN -India: Strengthening the Ties That Bind" was released at this roundtable. All the ASEAN countries nominated their officials and experts over 100 participants including senior officials attended the 5th AINTT roundtable.

The Roundtable had five major sessions to identify maritime challenges between ASEAN and India that need to be addressed through greater cooperation; to review the barriers to services trade between ASEAN and India for making a series of recommendations to strengthen the economic relations; to deal with cultural heritage of ASEAN and India and identify the scope and opportunities in promoting shared cultural relations; to identify the barriers to educational cooperation and design a way forward to strengthen the partnership and finally, to discuss the potential and challenges of ASEAN Economic Community (AEC) and implication for India and other dialogue partners. The Roundtable analysed and placed together the various components that would help strengthening the partnership between ASEAN and India.






ASEAN-India Strengthening the Ties That Bind


E-Compendium of RIS Publications of ASEAN-India Relations


Assessing Economic Impacts of Connectivity Corridor: (An Empirical Investigation)
